Limiting our Freedoms

If there's one thing we love, it's freedom. We have a whole day celebrating personal freedom. July Fourth is our Independence Day. It's the day we celebrate the American colonies breaking away from English rule.

It's so popular to us, in fact, that we have made it into a movie starring Will Smith about an alien attack. We like our freedom.

Think about the first time you drove a car without an adult. Do you remember what it felt like? You felt free. You felt like you could go anywhere and do anything. Except then there were probably rules put in place by parents. You had to be home at a certain time. You had to refill the gas. There were likely places you couldn't go, too. Then there are the speed limits.

It stinks going slow. You want to go fast and get to the destination as soon as possible.

These things were put in place so that you and other people would be safe. Yes: you were free, yet there were terms and conditions that applied to that. In a weird sort of way, the boundaries we have make us freer.

In 1Corinthians, Paul is trying to help the struggling church in Corinth. Chapter 10 in particular deals with idol meat. That was meat sacrificed to some other deity. The question was if it was okay to eat that meat or not. In 10:23, Paul writes, "'All things are lawful,' but not all things build up." He tells the people it's meat- nothing more. You're allowed to eat the meat sacrificed to other gods because to you it's just meat.



Yet Paul goes back to the notion of freedom and what is lawful. Basically, he says if someone raises a stink about it, then don't eat it. You don't do that for yourself because you know it's fine- it's just meat. No; you do it because you're thinking about the other person. They may not be in the same place you are spiritually. You don't want them to stumble and fall unintentionally, so you limit your freedoms to help someone else.

And that is the crux of it all. All rules and boundaries are set up

to show care and concern for others. We limit the things we do because while we could do anything, it's not always going to be beneficial for us or others. What are some things you've given up for others? How can you help others grow and learn by teaching proper boundaries?

George Justice then revealed the identity of the inductee. John shared a brief biography of Mick and his contributions to Condit and awarded him an official Men of Faith navy blue cap bearing the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) logo to the congregation's round of applause.


Mick's family moved to the Sunbury area during the summer of 1971. They began attending different churches and Condit was one of the first. They found a good fit and have attended ever since. Mick, his mom (Peggy Sheets), and then girlfriend (Pam Monroe) all joined Condit Presbyterian Church on November 4, 1984. He married that girlfriend in the church on November 7, 1987 with Rev. Alan Thalhuber officiating. The newlyweds moved to Irving, TX (for Mick's job at Cargill, Inc.). They had daughter, Emily, while living there. After four years, Cargill took them to North East, MD where son, Alex, was born. Requesting a transfer back to Ohio to be closer to family, the Sheets family then moved to New Carlisle, OH where they lived until September 2013 when they moved into their current home that they designed and had built on Murphy Rd. May 2024 Financials Submitted by Ken Bartlett

Our regular offering through May was approximately 74.3% of its five-month budget amount (\$52,609.00 of \$70,831.67; \$18,222.67 in arrears). A \$30,000 bequest was received in May. Total receipts through May were \$95,780.47 of the five-month budget amount of \$81,665.00, \$14,115.47 more than budget.

Insurance and real estate taxes have been fully paid for the year, per capita has been paid through half of the year. Total expenses through May were **\$72,541.90** against the five-month budget of **\$81,665.00**, resulting in outflows less than budget by **\$9,123.10**.

May year-to-date net was **\$23,238.57** in the black.

Receipts through May were **\$45,450.35** more than a year ago, while expenses were **\$37,110.55** more than a year ago. This results in the net being **\$8,339.80** better than a year ago.

Investment returns were up **6.3%** year-to-date. The \$30,000 bequest received in May was invested and investments totaled **\$294,957.97** as of the end of May. Total funds available were **\$344,841.30** as of the end of May.

Díd you know?

The Sea of Galilee is actually not a sea but a freshwater lake. Snow melt water from Mount Hermon seeps into rock channels to feed underground springs at the base of the mountain cluster. The spring waters form streams that merge and become the Jordan River, which is the water source flowing into the Sea of Galilee on its northern side. Water exits the Sea of Galilee on the southern end and reforms the Jordan River, which descends down Israel into the Dead Sea, a salt water body.

The Sea of Galilee is referred to by several names in the Bible, including the Sea of Tiberias, Lake Kinneret, and Lake of Gennesaret. It is approximately 13 miles long and 8 miles wide. Situated below sea level, it is the second lowest lake in the world, second only to the Dead Sea. The Sea of Galilee is well known and important to Christians because the Galilee region was "home territory" to Jesus and much of his ministry occurred along the shores of the lake. If one is familiar with the stories of Jesus calling the first four disciples, walking on water, calming the storm, feeding the five thousand and the miraculous catch of fish, one should understand the significance of the Sea of Galilee.

<u>Cauliflower Salad</u> Pre-mix: 2/3 c. light mayonnaise

1/3 cup sugar

Mix:

- 1 large head cauliflower chopped or shredded
- 1 ¹/₂ cup salted peanuts
- 1 package (70z.) dried cranberries

In a large bowl add all the above and stir until well combined.

Cover and refrigerate at least 1 hour.
