Fear Not

It's spooky season. The world has become populated with plastic skeletons and ghosts made from bed sheets. Soon, Charlie Brown will be gifted a rock while Linus patiently waits for The Great Pumpkin. And, of course, there are things that go bump in the night.

The goal is simple: creep people out. That is one of the hallmarks of this season. It is why we even call it "spooky season" as a joke. Fear is one of those primal human emotions. It's a basic emotion that exists in all people. It makes sense. We know that our lives are temporary and fragile. This is something that fills us with fear and anxiety.

It's interesting when you think of fear as a concept. When things are confusing, it tends to fill us with fear. This is something that is normal and natural. In fact, it's normal to have a fear response with things that scare or confuse us. There is just one slight issue with it.

God is. That is the best statement that I can come up with to describe God. God exists outside the normal human senses. God is so far removed from us that we can't fully understand God. God even identifies God's own self as "I Am" in Exodus 3:14. Not to mention all the names that we have for God in the Old Testament and the names like Jehovah that people make up and aren't even in the Bible in the original Hebrew.

All of this makes God confusing. If God is confusing, then, God will fill us with fear. This wouldn't be a problem except for the fact that God wants a relationship with us. The idea or concept of God, though, when we think about it, fills us with fear. Even

the messengers of God- the angels- have to announce their presence with "Be not afraid" because it's all out of the human condition.

Yet here is the thing about fear: once you understand something, the fear disappears. God does not want us to live in fear, but instead know and respect God. This is why the person of Jesus is so important to us. Jesus is the way that we can come to know God. God does not want us to live in fear. Rather, God wants us to know God and love God. In order for this to happen, God sent God's only son Jesus to show us all about God's love. There are no scary tricks with God. There is only the love of God found in Christ Jesus as the sweetest treat there is.

What are some ways that we can come to know God more fully? How do you address God in your prayers? What does it mean for you to "serve the LORD with fear and trembling?" (Psalm 2:11) What do we know and understand about God?

Getting to Know You...

Grant Bartlett

Grant Bartlett was baptized in the Sanctuary as an infant on the same day in 1997 his parents, Ken and Doreen, joined Condit Presbyterian Church. He has been an involved part of the congregation ever since.

He participated in the Sunday School classes and Youth Fellowship, sang in the choir, played bells in the Bell Choir, acted in church plays, served as Youth Elder and as liturgist and usher when needed. John Whitney, who led the youth class and fellowship, says Grant was always a leader and liked to play devil's advocate. Grant explains he asks questions because he "likes to see every opinion out there." He was Condit's Man of the Year in 2015.

Grant was in Boy Scouts from Cub Scout until he was 16. That's where, he says, he got his love for camping and hiking. He was one of four youth leaders for the Columbus Troop, serving as scribe, for the inaugural jamboree held at Summit Bechtel Reserve in WV in 2013. At Big Walnut High School he was on the tennis team and served as assistant coach for five years following graduation in 2016.

From the time he was a boy playing with his toy soldiers, Grant knew he wanted to join the army. He was 17 when he talked to a recruiter at the high school and signed with the Army Reserve. He attended basic training between his junior and senior years and trained as a Tactical Power Generation Specialist. For eight years as a reservist he supervised and performed maintenance and repairs on power-generation equipment, internal combustion engines and associated equipment.

As a civilian he was an apprentice electrician for Appalachian Renewable Power for two years installing the electrical portion of solar power systems. Then he became an electrician with Area Energy and Electric, Inc. working in residential, commercial and industrial installation as well as completing the OSHA 30 certification for safety in the workplace.

When Covid hit, his Reserve unit was called to provide

power distribution to temporary hospital facilities in New York and California. Grant, however, was kept behind to help with the logistics of getting everyone and everything shipped out.

He says, himself, he can't sit still. He needs to be doing something; he needs to be working with his hands. He feels a calling to help others. Consequently, starting in June 2023, Grant spent 11 months at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, TX training to be a Biomedical Equipment Technician learning and doing preventative maintenance and fault isolation on equipment including incubators, suction units, ECGs, infusion pumps, diagnostic imaging equipment and dental chairs to mention a few. He was an honor graduate.

Recently he started a new job at Riverside Methodist Hospital where he's already performing preventive maintenance on various types of medical equipment. He's very happy working at Riverside and feels what he's doing definitely will affect patient quality of life.

Even though he lives in Reynoldsburg, Grant's contribution to the life of Condit Presbyterian Church is as strong as ever. He is an adult Elder, sings bass in the choir, plays the trumpet in the occasional brass quartet, runs the monthly euchre night and helps wherever needed. Most recently he spent an afternoon squatting down by the kids' *Continued on page 5*

fish pool at Sunbury's Sizzle and Sound. That's where he got one of the Condit Church wrist bands Marianne Westbrook purchased for promotional pieces. (They are available in a box in the Narthex. Take one.)

Grant wears his wristband proudly because he sees potential in Condit Church. He would like to see more young people attracted to the church. He suggests an adult Sunday School class before worship as well as more activities outside of Sunday such as small group worship and more frequent Bible studies.

He feels Condit does a "great job" connecting with those who have lost their faith. "It's because we are a welcoming, come-as-you-are, accepting type of church," he says.

"I don't think the church should get politicized and wrapped up in its differences," Grant says. "The role of the church is making sure everyone feels the love of God. The church should do what Jesus has called us to do—love God and our neighbor."



Treasurer's Report

August 2024 Financials Submitted by Ken Bartlett

Our regular offering through August was approximately 62.7% of its eight-month budget amount (\$71,021.80 of \$113,330.67; \$42,308.87 in arrears). A \$30,300 bequest was received in May. Total receipts through August were \$120,430.61 of the eight-month budget amount of \$130,664.00, \$10,233.39 less than budget.

Insurance and real estate taxes have been fully paid for the year, per capita has been paid for three-quarters of the year. Total expenses through August were \$116,359.38 against the eight-month budget of \$130,664.00, resulting in outflows less than budget by \$14,304.62.

August net was nearly \$14,000 in the red. August year-to-date net was \$4,071.23 in the black.

Receipts through August were \$39,944.47 more than a year ago, while expenses were \$64,546.53 more than a year ago. This results in the net being \$24,602.06 worse than a year ago.

Investment returns were up **11.8%** year-to-date. The \$30,000 bequest received in May was invested and investments totaled **\$308,711.17** as of the end of August. Total funds available were **\$339,177.43** as of the end of August. \$153,217.14 of this amount is general undesignated funds, \$156,003.41 is Condit's Building Fund balance, and \$29,956.88 is the aggregate balance of a variety of special funds.
